For identification of archaeological objects from the United States, the state archaeologist of the state where the object was found is likely able to provide the best information. What We Collect

As one of the few museums in the United States dedicated to folk art from around the world, the Museum of International Folk Art expands understandings of folk art and encourages dialogue about the dynamic nature of tradition, cultural identity, community, and aesthetics. Our collection reflects important connections between past, present, and future folk art and related traditions, including ethnographic, ethnic, vernacular, and traditional arts; self-taught or visionary art; and handicrafts.

We actively collect a wide range of folk art associated with communities from all over the world. Learn how we define folk art <u>HERE</u>. We assess potential donations on a case-by-case basis.

Our collecting priorities include:

- historic and contemporary examples of handmade folk art
- folk art traditions that are under-represented in our extant collection
- folk art from communities that are under-represented in our extant collection
- folk art related to curatorial research and exhibitions plans
- collections that include strong provenance documentation
- artworks by National Heritage Fellows (National Endowment of the Arts)

We do not collect:

- archaeological material
- antiquities
- fragments of larger works
- industrially manufactured dolls and toys
- objects in poor condition
